2.6 Innovative processes adopted by the institution in Teaching and Learning:

DEBATING UNION

Aim: The IndSearch debating Union has been formed with an aim to help students improve their public speaking skills and also identify and analyze various problems and issues in a holistic manner. Participating in debates not only enhances the knowledge of students but also increase their competence and boost their confidence.

Methodology:

There are specific slots provided in the time-table for the debating union activity. The activity commences from week 2. Topics for every week are given by the Coordinators in the preceding week. The class representatives need to contact the coordinators to get the topic.

For each topic 2 teams prepare for the debate. There are two teams namely 'FOR team' and an 'AGAINST team'. Both the teams comprise of 2 participants each and each participant gets a 2 minutes time to put forth his point. The debate begins with the FOR Team followed by the AGAINST team. After which both teams get 10 minutes to prepare a rejoinder. After which the AGAINST team speaks first followed by the FOR team.

The winning teams then compete with other winning teams from other classes.

The topics range from subject specific issues to general management issues to current affairs. Students are expected to extensively research the topic while preparing for the debate.

The debate carries weightage of 5 marks for each full credit paper in the concurrent evaluation and is mandatory for all.

Students learn to think independently.

Students get into habit of reading some thing which is not easily available on the internet.

Boost confidence.

Improved performance in Group discussion rounds during placements.

Differential Experiential Learning and Corporate Internship (DELCI)

Objectives of the Practice - Objectives of DELCI are:

- To help students get a real life exposure to the corporate world
- To ensure that through the internship the students enhance their employability and understand Industry Expectations from them
- · To create Zero gestation period employees for the Industry
- To help students relate the theory to the practical and applications part
- To give students an exposure of the corporate world and help them appreciate the working of the Corporate world
- To prepare a positive mindset of the students while entering the corporate world

The Context - The challenges that we faced while implementing DELCI were:

- Ensuring that students while undergoing the DELCI do not compromise on their academics
- Ensuring that the Industry reciprocates with providing the right kind of guidance to the students.
- · Making students realize that an Internship is a pathway to future career
- Getting students to take extra efforts to ensure that they do not lag on the academic front.

The Practice - The actual conduct of DELCI was as follows:

- Students enrol/register for the DELCI programme
- Based on the requirement of the Industry partners, the students can go for an internship for either 2, 3 or 4 days in a week.
- The classes that the students miss are arranged for them separately on the weekends. (Format of a crash course)
- They are also asked to submit assignments in lieu of attendance to ensure that they are abreast of the happenings in the class and are able to cope up with the curriculum
- Faculty members are available on weekends to solve problems/difficulties if any that students may face

Title of the Practice

Internationalization of Education by providing an International knowledge environment required to develop global competencies.

Objectives of the Practice

- To provide the students and faculty with an International Environment for teaching and learning
- To provide students and faculty with International exposure.
- To help students understand and appreciate the various aspects of cross-cultural
- To help students develop global competencies required to compete in the global

The Context

- The Institute has signed and MoU with the University of Wisconsin, Parkside, . USA and the Institute of Certified Management Accountants, Sri Lanka.
- •
- Preparing and orienting the students and faculty to visit the partner countries. Receiving Students and faculty from UWP and Sri Lanka and giving them a holistic view of the Indian economic, Corporate and cultural scenario

The Practice

- Under the MoU with the University of Wisconsin, Parkside, (UWP) USA a student who has completed his MBA at IndSearch can get direct admission for the MBA or MS programme of UWP. He is not required to take the GRE/GMAT or TOEFL.
- Further since the student has completed the MBA at IndSearch, he is given an exemption for certain credits, thus enabling him /her to complete the Masters programme at UWP in one year and saving on the Lodging and boarding costs.
- Another aspect of the MoU is the opportunity for IndSearch students to go for a Summer exchange programme and earn a few add on credits at UWP
- So far 26 students from IndSearch have visited UWP out of which 3 students . visited in the Academic Year 2017-18
- Students from Wisconsin also visit IndSearch regularly facilitating cultural exchange between the faculty and students
- Faculty from Wisconsin have also visited IndSearch and conducted sessions on certain modules for the students.
- Students and faculty members have also visited ICMA Sri Lanka. During the Sri Lanka visit Students were able to observe the culture and traditions of Sri Lanka and understand the geopolitical aspects of the neighbouring country.
- Students from Sri Lanka have also visited IndSearch along with their faculty facilitating cultural exchange.

Evidence of Success

- All students who opted for the Summer exchange or the Masters programme have successfully completed the same.
- Among those who visited the UWP, 24 students have become global corporate citizens working in the USA.
- 2 students have come back to Indi after studying at UWP. One of the Students has started his own enterprise while the other has taken up a corporate career in India
- The exposure provided by the Institute has helped the students to develop the competencies required to work on an international level and prove their worth.
